SC SWCS-Sponsored Renewable Energy Symposium Draws a Crowd

The South Carolina Chapter of the Soil and Water Conservation Society kicked off 2007 with a bang. The Palmetto Chapter hosted a well-attended symposium in Myrtle Beach on January 3rd. "The Future of Renewable Energy in South Carolina," drew over 150 participants including state and federal agency leaders, private citizens, and a host of SWCS members. An exhibit hall featured a number of companies and agencies, and Clemson University taped a radio interview highlighting the symposium and SWCS for playback on SC Educational Radio Network.

The symposium lineup included local and national speakers who explored topics ranging from bio-diesel use for agriculture, Green Power, and USDA incentives for use of E-85 and bio-diesel. The forum also included perspectives on alternative energy use from farmers who are currently using it, and then a Q & A forum generated lively discussion.

The event was capped off with an awards ceremony and dinner where more than 250 attendees enjoyed a great seafood dinner and witnessed award presentations and swearing in of officers for 2007. Outgoing SC SWCS President Von Snelgrove said, "This excellent turnout for the symposium and awards dinner is a sign of great things to come in 2007 for our chapter."

Von Snelgrove, 2006 SC SWCS President, welcomed SWCD Commissioners, SWCS members and guests to the SC Chapter SWCS Awards Dinner. The dinner and awards ceremony took place at Bennett's Seafood in Myrtle Beach, SC, in conjunction with the Conservation Partnership Conference.
